We hope this letter finds you well.

Let us start by offering our thanks for the increased level of funding for Substance Abuse Prevention and Intervention Specialists (SAPIS) for the 2016-2017 school year. It was much appreciated and certainly much needed.

Sadly, however, we are not able to say that a reduction in the number of opioid-related deaths has been the result of added SAPIS; indeed, the depth of the opioid crisis increases unabated despite the best effort of many agencies and community organizations to fight this terror on any and all fronts.

If we were losing this number people because of gun violence, the hue and cry would be deafening. If so many were dying by contracting an exotic disease or virus, the entire nation would be mobilized in an attempt to eradicate it.

We understand that many resources are being utilized, but we believe that given the enormity of the problem and the increase in mortality that we could be – and should be – doing so much more to combat addiction disease.

We are not going to quote to you statistics with which you are already familiar; we are not talking about numbers, we are talking about the slow and painful loss of human life, and the attendant grief suffered by the families left behind. It is taking a toll not only on our borough, our city and our state, but on our entire nation.




